## Reflections on a career in commercial showbusiness

The 30-plus years in commercial showbusiness have been fabulous. With my wife/partner L.J. Newton, who retired from the stage in 1999, we toured far-and-wide across the U.S. with our two shows, Mr. Slim's Goodtime Ragtime Vaudeville Revival, and Mr. Slim & L.J. / Classic Comedy Juggling. There was seldom a dull moment performing at theatres, colleges, fairs, festivals, resorts, clubs, casinos, conventions, revues, circuses, museums - the gamut of venues from shaky outdoor stages to the finest theatrical palaces.

The audience approval – the instant feedback on our work - was invaluable, and the heady wash of applause will always echo in memory.

Likewise, the recognition was appreciated, and the respect of peers cherished. But the deepest satisfaction is in knowing that for decades our live shows brought people together. Sometimes the audience was 50, sometimes 5000, but over the years we entertained millions – live, in person, bringing them together to share an experience with us, their friends, or family. In my view that's the real value of the performing arts - bringing people together.

Most significant were the people we met in our travels. We had the opportunity to work with the very best performers in their respective fields. All these elite performers were superb craftsmen, many were inspirational geniuses, some were selfabsorbed egomaniacs, and a few were memorable eccentrics - but the bond among fellow performers is strong, and we embraced friendship with them all.

This career would not have been possible without the efforts of hundreds of agents, producers, and entertainment directors. For 30 years of partnership,

we say a big, sincere Thank You for your confidence in us.

(Note: My comments on the lower order of parasites, middlemen, charlatans, and other serpents-of-thedeep that populate the business are reserved for my private memoirs!) ■


